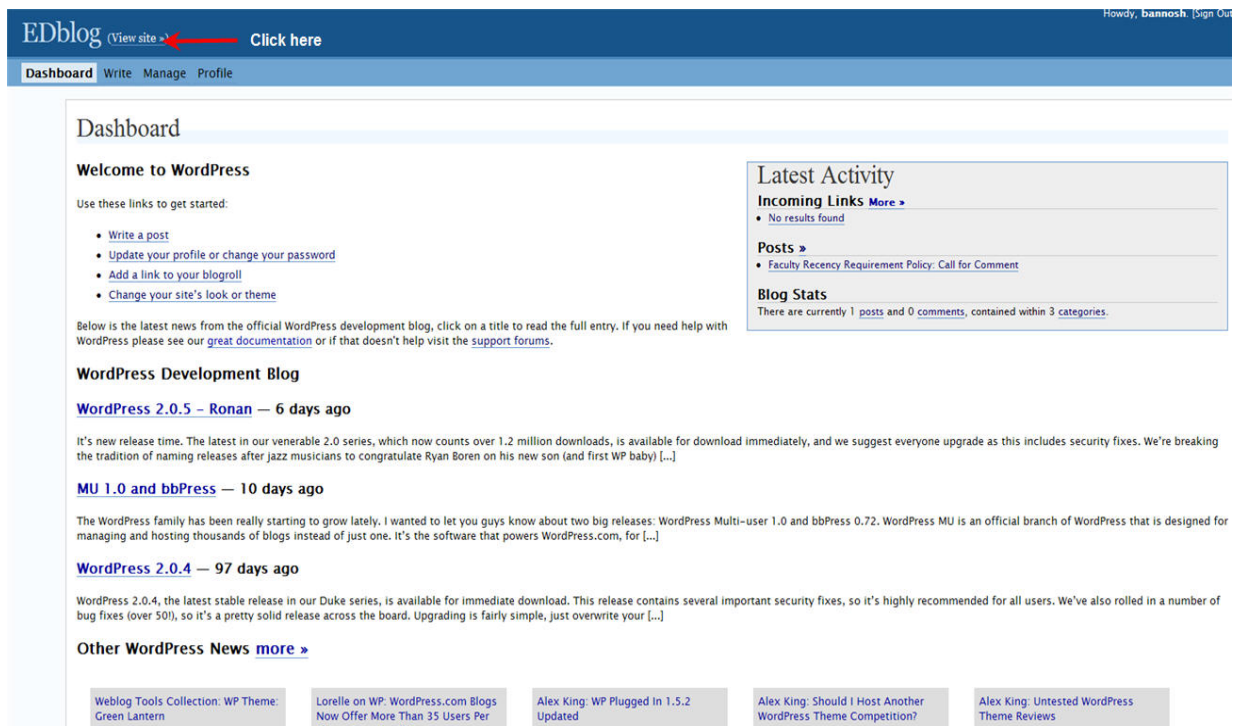
2. EDBlog main page will be displayed. Click login in right-column under the Meta section.

NCATE defines **professional education faculty** as “those individuals employed by a college or university, including graduate teaching assistants, who teach one or more courses in education, provide services to candidates (e.g., advising), supervise clinical experiences, or administer some portion of the unit.”

This draft was prepared based on (a) input from the Partnership Council on the Education Profession which includes College of Education faculty and representatives of school systems in the East Alabama Regional Inservice Center and (b) preliminary review by department heads.
